Remedy Proposed for Manufactured Gas Plant Site Public Comment Period Announced

The public is invited to comment on a proposed remedy being reviewed by the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (NYSDEC), in consultation with the New York State Department of Health (NYSDOH), to address contamination related to the CE Hunts Point MGP site ("site") located at Hunts Point, Bronx, County. This fact sheet addresses the proposed remedy for an off-site area, located beneath Halleck Street. Please see the map for the site location.

How to Comment: NYSDEC is accepting written comments about the proposed plan, called an "Alternatives Analysis Report (AAR)" for 45 days, from **January 13, 2021 through February 26, 2021**.

Draft Remedial Work Plan: The proposed remedy consists of:

- Site cover consisting of the road surface, which will be maintained to prevent exposures to contaminants beneath the road; and
- Development of a Site Management Plan (SMP) for long-term monitoring and maintenance of institutional and engineering controls, to ensure proper use of the site, as well as provide for removal of contaminated material in the event of planned work in the street.

The proposed remedy was developed by Consolidated Edison of New York after performing a detailed investigation of the site under New York's Manufactured Gas Plant (MGP) Program.

Next Steps: NYSDEC will consider public comments, revise the cleanup plan as necessary, and issue a final Decision Document. NYSDOH must concur with the proposed remedy. After approval, the proposed remedy becomes the selected remedy. Consolidated Edison may then design and perform the cleanup action to address the site contamination, with oversight by NYSDEC and NYSDOH.

NYSDEC will keep the public informed throughout the investigation and cleanup of the site.

Site Description: The site being addressed under this alternatives analysis is the length of Halleck Street at Hunts Point that is affected by the historic MGP contamination. This area includes the entire width of Halleck Street extending approximately one half-mile from the intersection of Market Street, south to the end of Halleck street. The remaining portions of the Hunts Point MGP site have already been addressed or are currently being addressed through the Voluntary Cleanup Program and the Brownfield Cleanup Program.

Summary of the Investigation: The primary contaminants of concern at the site are MGP-related volatile organic compounds (VOCs) and semi-volatile organic compounds (SVOCs) from coal tar, which are present site-wide in soil and groundwater. These contaminants originated from the historic MGP operation. MGP waste at this off-site area beneath Halleck Street is located approximately twelve feet below grade.

Manufactured Gas Plant Program: New York's MGP Program oversees investigation, evaluation, cleanup and

long-term monitoring of former MGP that had been historically used to manufacture gas in the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries. Many of these gas plants were operated by the predecessor companies of our modern-day utility companies.

The gas manufacturing process involved the heating of coal and/or petroleum products to produce a gas mixture. Once cooled and purified, the gas was distributed through a local pipeline network. The gas was used for heating and cooking much like natural gas is used today. In the early years, the gas was also used for lighting in homes and streetlights.

The aim of the program is to prevent future impacts to human health and the environment and to ensure that the sites can be safely used. These uses may include recreation, housing, business or other uses.
