Cleanup Action Completed at Brownfield Site

Action has been completed to address the contamination related to the 281-301 Warner Ave site ("site") located at 281-301 Warner Avenue, Roslyn, Nassau County under New York State's Brownfield Cleanup Program (BCP). Please see the map for the site location.

Cleanup activities were performed by Warner Ave LLC ("applicant") with oversight provided by the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (NYSDEC). The applicant has submitted a proposed Final Engineering Report (FER) for NYSDEC review which states that cleanup requirements have been or will be achieved to fully protect public health and the environment for the proposed site use.

Highlights of the Site Cleanup: The following activities have been or will shortly be completed to achieve the remedial action objectives:

- Excavation and off-site disposal of about 4,000 cubic yards of impacted soil exceeding the Unrestricted Use soil cleanup objectives, the site-specific cleanup criteria. Clean fill was and will be brought in to replace the excavated soil and to establish the design grades at the site.
- Collecting and analyzing post remedial soil samples to evaluate the effectiveness of the remedy;
- Development of a Site Management Plan (SMP) for long-term management of residual contamination as required by the Environmental Easement, including plans for: (1) Institutional and Engineering Controls (IC/ECs), (2) monitoring, (3) operation and maintenance, and (4) reporting;
- An Environmental Easement will be recorded to prevent future exposure to any contamination remaining at the site and to ensure implementation of the SMP; and
- Completion of a post-excavation soil vapor intrusion (SVI) investigation. A soil vapor monitoring/mitigation contingency plan will be implemented consistent with the New York State Department

of Health (NYSDOH) requirements to address any SVI concerns, if necessary.

Next Steps: When NYSDEC approves the FER, it will be made available to the public (see "Where to Find Information"). NYSDEC then will issue a Certificate of Completion (COC) that will be announced in a fact sheet. The applicant would be able to redevelop the site after receiving a COC. In addition, the applicant will be eligible for tax credits to offset a portion of the costs of performing cleanup activities and for redevelopment of the site.

Site Description: The 281-301 Warner Ave LLC site is a 0.85-acre site located in a suburban area. The site is located just north of Long Island Rail Road (LIRR) parking lot, and in the northwest corner of the intersection of Warner Ave. and Railroad Ave in the Village of Roslyn, Town of North Hempstead, Nassau County.

The site is built into the hillside and is being redeveloped into both commercial and residential uses. Residential units will be situated on the upper floors above commercial storefronts along Warner Ave. Covered parking will be on the ground level. The site is currently under construction and zoned as mixed commercial to residential.

The site was originally developed sometime between 1947 and 1951. Various commercial tenants have occupied the individual storefront units since the building was constructed. A dry cleaner operated at the address of 289 Warner Ave from approximately 1974 to 2010. Other noted operators of the site include a laundromat, a textile company, a nail spa, an auto parts retailer, and printing studio. Prior to the site entering the BCP in 2018, several petroleum spills were reported to the NYSDEC and were closed prior to 2018. In 2017 an investigation revealed chlorinated solvents associated with the former dry-cleaning operation. The site soils consist of layered sands, gravels, and cobbles. Depth to groundwater is 90-102 feet below the ground surface, with groundwater flowing to the north.
