### Interim Remedial Measure Completed; Report Recommends No Further Action at Brownfield Site; Public Comment Period Announced

The public is invited to comment on a proposed no further action remedy for the 2103 Ralph Avenue site ("site") located at 2103 Ralph Avenue, Brooklyn, Kings County. Please see the map for the site location. Documents related to the cleanup of this site can be found at the location(s) identified to the left under "Where to Find Information."

The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (NYSDEC), in consultation with the New York State Department of Health (NYSDOH), is reviewing a report that recommends no further action at the site. The report, called an Alternatives Analysis Report, was prepared and submitted to NYSDEC by Tenen-Environmental, LLC on behalf of Georgetowne Center Brooklyn LLC. ("applicant(s)") dated February 2019.

<u>How to Comment</u>: NYSDEC is accepting written comments about the report for 45 days, from **April 10, 2019** through **May 25, 2019**. The report is available for public review at the location(s) identified at left under "Where to Find Information." Please submit comments to the NYSDEC project manager listed under Project-Related Questions in the "Who to Contact" area at left.

<u>Proposed No Further Action Remedy:</u> The no further action proposal is based on the completion of expedited cleanups known as Interim Remedial Measures (IRMs) conducted before the report was submitted by the applicant. The completed IRMs included the following:

- Excavation and off-site disposal of approximately 40 cubic yards of contaminated soil:
- Excavation and grading of soil/fill to a depth of one foot below grade, consistent with the depth required to install a sub-slab depressurization system;
- Installation and maintenance of an active sub-slab depressurization system; and
- Construction and maintenance of a composite cover system consisting of a six-inch thick concrete building slab underlain with a vapor barrier.

Before the completion of the IRMs, post excavation soil sampling was completed to identify any remaining contamination. The results indicate residual contamination consistent with historic fill materials remains in on-site soils. Since contaminated soil remains beneath the site, Institutional and Engineering Controls are required to protect human health and the environment. The applicant will be submitting a Site Management Plan (SMP).

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The SMP will serve as the basis for maintaining the protection of public health and the environment through monitoring and the continued operation and maintenance of completed remedial actions. The plan will address the required engineering controls as well as the maintenance and enforcement of institutional controls such as an Environmental Easement (EE).

<u>Next Steps</u>: NYSDEC will consider public comments, make any necessary revisions and, if appropriate, approve the report and its no further action recommendation. The approved report will be made available to the public under "Where to Find Information" on Page 1 of this fact sheet.

When the report and other final documents are approved, NYSDEC will issue a Certificate of Completion (COC) to the applicant(s). The applicant(s) would be able to redevelop the site after receiving a COC. In addition, the applicant(s):

- Will have no liability to the State for contamination at or coming from the site, subject to certain conditions; and
- Will be eligible for tax credits to offset a portion of the costs of performing cleanup activities and for redevelopment of the site.

A COC may be modified or revoked if, for example, an applicant does not comply with the terms of its Brownfield Cleanup Agreement with NYSDEC.

Site Description and Background: The 2103 Ralph Avenue site is located in an urban area in Brooklyn, NY. The site is identified as unit #33, with an address of 2103 Ralph Avenue, which is located within the southwest portion of the Georgetown Shopping Center with an overall address of 2181 Ralph Avenue, Brooklyn, NY. The site is a 2,420 square foot (0.06 acre) unit in a one-story building located in the southwest portion of the Georgetown Shopping Center. The site is currently zoned as C2-2, which allows for commercial use, and is currently occupied by a Pearl Vision eyeglasses store. The subject property was originally marshland that was drained by 1924. The larger property containing the site was used by the Jamaica Dredging Company from the 1920s through the early 1950s, which likely filled the site and surrounding areas using dredged material from Paerdegat Basin. The site was developed as a shopping center between 1967-1970 and has been used for commercial spaces since that time. Past land uses include a number of commercial establishments, including a dry cleaner which operated on-site for 27 years until at least the early 1990s.
