Environmental Cleanup to Begin at Brownfield Site

Action is about to begin that will address contamination related to the Broadway Triangle Site A site ("site") located at 663 - 667 Flushing Avenue and 29 - 31 Bartlett Street, Brooklyn, New York, 11206. Please see the map for the site location. The cleanup activities will be performed by Barlett Crossing LLC, Bartlett Crossing Managers LLC, and Bartlett Crossing UNP LLC ("applicants") with oversight provided by the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (NYSDEC). NYSDEC has determined that the Remedial Action Work Plan (RAWP) protects public health and the environment and has approved the plan.

Cleanup activities are expected to begin in December 2025 and last about 5 months.

Highlights of the Upcoming Cleanup Activities

The goal of the cleanup action for the site is to achieve cleanup levels that protect public health and the environment. The key components of the cleanup are:

- Excavation and off-site disposal of soil exceeding the restricted residential soil cleanup objectives (SCOs) in the upper 2 feet across the entire site.
- Collection and analysis of site-wide post-remedial excavation samples to evaluate the performance of the remedy.
- Installation of a cover system to prevent exposure to remaining soil exceeding the above noted SCOs. The cover system will consist of concrete building slabs, asphalt pavement, concrete sidewalk, and/or a minimum of two feet of clean fill over a demarcation layer.
- Importation of clean material that meets the established SCOs for use as backfill.
- Recording of an Environmental Easement to ensure proper Site use and to prevent future exposure to any remaining residual contamination.
- Implementation of a Site Management Plan for management of remaining contamination including, but not limited to, inspection and maintenance of the site cover.

A site-specific Health and Safety Plan (HASP) and a Community Air Monitoring Plan (CAMP) will be implemented during cleanup activities. The HASP and CAMP establish procedures to protect on-site workers and residents and include required air monitoring as well as dust and odor suppression measures.

Next Steps

After the applicant(s) completes the cleanup activities, they will prepare a Final Engineering Report (FER) and submit it to NYSDEC. The FER will describe the cleanup activities completed and certify that cleanup requirements have been achieved or will be achieved.

When NYSDEC is satisfied that cleanup requirements have been achieved or will be achieved for the site, it will approve the FER. NYSDEC will then issue a Certificate of Completion (COC) to the applicant(s). The applicant(s) would be able to redevelop the site in conjunction with receiving a COC. In addition, the applicant(s) would be eligible for tax credits to offset the costs of performing cleanup activities and for redevelopment of the site.

NYSDEC will issue a fact sheet that describes the content of the FER. The fact sheet will identify any institutional controls (for example, environmental easements) or engineering controls (for example, a site cover) necessary at the site in relation to the issuance of the COC.

Site Description

The site is 0.33-acres divided into two non-contiguous parcels. Site A1 is bordered on the south by Flushing Avenue and on the east by Whipple Street. Site A2 is located further northwest and is bordered by Bartlett Street to the southeast. Both parcels are currently vacant, overgrown and undeveloped lots with several patches of exposed concrete. The site was developed as early as 1887 with several commercial and residential structures (including several outbuildings). Commercial uses have included retail stores, bakery, fur dresser, carpenter's shop, and sausage factory. The site was occupied by mixed-use buildings (residential, retail, manufacturing) by 1965. The site has been vacant since circa 1980.

Planned redevelopment at the site includes a 9-story mixed-use residential/commercial building on Site A1 and a 9-story residential building on Site A2. Both buildings are planned to be 100% affordable housing.

Brownfield Cleanup Program

New York's Brownfield Cleanup Program (BCP) encourages the voluntary cleanup of contaminated properties known as "brownfields" so that they can be reused and redeveloped. These uses may include recreation, housing, business or other uses. A brownfield site is any real property where a contaminant is present at levels exceeding the soil cleanup objectives or other health-based or environmental standards, criteria or guidance adopted by NYSDEC that are applicable based on the reasonably anticipated use of the property, in accordance with applicable regulations.


