Report Recommends Cleanup of Brownfield Site Contamination

The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (NYSDEC) is reviewing the Remedial Investigation Report for the 1301 Metropolitan Avenue site ("site") located at 1301 Metropolitan Avenue, Brooklyn, King County. Please see the map for the site location.

Remedial Investigation Report: The Remedial Investigation Report (RIR) describes the results of the site investigation and recommends development of a cleanup plan to address the contamination that was found. The RIR was submitted by 1301 Metro-Rudolph Q, LLC, 1301 Metro-Triple JQ, LLC, and 1301 Metro-255, LLC ("applicants").

Based on the findings of the investigation, NYSDEC, in consultation with the New York State Department of Health (NYSDOH), has determined that the site does not pose a significant threat to public health or the environment.

Highlights of the Remedial Investigation Report: Polycyclic aromatic hydrocarbons (PAHs) and metals were found in subsurface soils at concentrations above use-specific soil cleanup objectives. The PAHs and metals are present at depths up to 15 feet below grade and are likely the result of past site uses and historic fill, which is present throughout the site. Petroleum product was encountered in one location near the center of the site. In addition, petroleum-related volatile organic compounds (VOCs), PAHs, and metals were found in groundwater above applicable standards. Petroleum-related VOCs and chlorinated VOCs were detected in soil vapor in the southwestern portion of the site.

Next Steps: NYSDEC will complete its review, make any necessary revisions and, if appropriate, approve the investigation report. The approved report will be made available to the public (see "Where to Find Information" at left). The applicants may then develop a cleanup plan, called a "Remedial Action Work Plan." This plan describes how contamination will be addressed, with NYSDEC and

NYSDOH overseeing the work. NYSDEC will present the draft cleanup plan to the public for its review and comment during a 45-day comment period. NYSDEC will keep the public informed throughout the investigation and cleanup of the site.

Site Description: The 1.543-acre site is located in the East Williamsburg neighborhood of Brooklyn and comprises a portion of Block 2948, Lot 85 on the New York City Tax Map. The site is bounded to the west and north by a lumber company, to the east by the East Branch of Newtown Creek, and to the south by Metropolitan Avenue. The currently vacant site is zoned for industrial use, paved without any structures or vegetation, and was most recently used as parking for a crane company and a road painting company. Historical site uses include various commercial operations including an asphalt company, several trucking companies, a concrete business, rigging company, and a lumber business. An above ground storage tank was formerly present in the north-central portion of the site as part of the asphalt company. Fourteen underground storage tanks (USTs) in the southwestern corner of the site were closed in place and up to two USTs were historically present in the south-central portion of the site.

No redevelopment of the site is anticipated at this time.
