DEC's Division of Environmental Remediation (DER) now distributes information about contaminated sites *electronically by email*.

DER cannot register your email address - only the email address owner can do so. If you already have signed up for the listserv for the county in which the site is located, you need do nothing.

**Report Recommends Cleanup of Contamination;
Remedy Proposed for Brownfield Site Contamination;
Public Comment Period Announced**

The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (NYSDEC), in consultation with the New York State Department of Health (NYSDOH), is reviewing a “Remedial Investigation Report (RIR)” and the proposed remedy to address contamination related to the Consumers Park Brewery Site (“site”) located at 960 Franklin Avenue, Brooklyn, NY. The public is invited to comment on a proposed remedy. Please see the map for the site location.

Based on the findings of the investigation, NYSDEC in consultation with NYSDOH has determined that the site poses a significant threat to human health. This decision is based on the potential for off-site migration and human exposure to site-related contaminants via soil vapors. To address this threat, a remedy was proposed and is summarized below.

How to Comment: NYSDEC is accepting written comments about the proposed plan, called a “Draft Remedial Action Work Plan (RAWP)” for 45 days, from **July 3 through August 19, 2024.**

Draft Remedial Work Plan: The proposed Unrestricted Use remedy consists of:

- Removing underground storage tanks, if encountered;
- Excavation and off-site disposal of approximately 33,000 cubic yards of contaminated soil up to a depth of 13 feet below grade (ft bg) in the southern area of the site, 20 ft bg in the northern area of the site, and up to 20 ft bg in “hot spot” areas;
- Collecting and analyzing post-remedial soil and groundwater samples to evaluate the effectiveness of the remedy;
- Importing clean fill that meets the established soil cleanup objectives for use as backfill;
- Installing and operating an active sub-slab depressurization system to mitigate the potential for soil vapor intrusion into the new building to be constructed at the site;
- Implementing a Health and Safety Plan and Community Air Monitoring Plan during all ground intrusive activities;
- Implementation of a Site Management Plan would also be required for long-term maintenance of the remedial systems; and
- Recording of an Environmental Easement to ensure proper use of the site.

BROWNFIELD CLEANUP PROGRAM

The proposed remedy was developed by Franklin Plaza II LLC and 960 Franklin LLC (“applicants”) after performing a detailed investigation of the site under New York’s Brownfield Cleanup Program (BCP). A “Remedial Investigation Report”, which describes the results of the site investigation was submitted concurrently with the Remedial Action Work Plan and is also available for review at the locations identified on Page 1.

Next Steps: NYSDEC will complete its review, make any necessary revisions and, if appropriate, approve the investigation report. The approved report will be made available to the public.

NYSDEC will consider public comments, revise the cleanup plan as necessary, and issue a final Decision Document. NYSDOH must concur with the proposed remedy. After approval, the proposed remedy becomes the selected remedy. The applicants may then design and perform the cleanup action to address the site contamination, with oversight by NYSDEC and NYSDOH.

NYSDEC will keep the public informed throughout the investigation and cleanup of the site.

Site Description: The 1.558-acre site is located in the Crown Heights section of Brooklyn and bounded to the north by Montgomery Street, to the east by Franklin Avenue, to the south by a vacant one-story industrial/manufacturing building, and to the west by the New York City Metropolitan Transportation Authority Subway “S” line. The site is currently vacant, and a majority is covered by the former buildings’ concrete slabs. Historical uses of the site include various warehousing and storage, cotton and felt manufacturing, glass cutting and bottling facilities, wire cutting, and spice importing.

The proposed redevelopment includes demolition of the former buildings’ concrete slabs and construction of a new 7-story residential building, including an affordable housing component.

Summary of the Investigation: The primary contaminants of concern at the site are semi-volatile organic compounds (SVOCs), chlorinated volatile organic compounds (CVOCs) and metals in soil, volatile organic compounds (VOCs), CVOCs, SVOCs and metals in groundwater, and CVOCs in soil vapor.

Brownfield Cleanup Program: New York’s Brownfield Cleanup Program (BCP) encourages the voluntary cleanup of contaminated properties known as “brownfields” so that they can be reused and redeveloped. These uses may include recreation, housing, business or other uses. A brownfield site is any real property where a contaminant is present at levels exceeding the soil cleanup objectives or other health-based or environmental standards, criteria or guidance adopted by DEC that are applicable based on the reasonably anticipated use of the property, in accordance with applicable regulations. 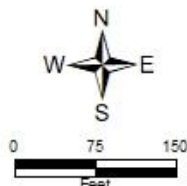
