Remedy Proposed for Brownfield Site Contamination; Public Comment Period Announced

The public is invited to comment on a proposed remedy being reviewed by the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (NYSDEC), in consultation with the New York State Department of Health (NYSDOH), to address contamination related to the 29-05 38th Avenue Site ("site") located at 29-05 38th Avenue, Long Island City, NY. Please see the map for the site location.

Remedial Investigation Report: The Remedial Investigation Report (RIR) describes the results of the site investigation and recommends development of a remedy to address the contaminant that was found. The RIR was submitted by FH 2BRO Builder Corp. (the "applicant").

Based on the findings of the investigation, NYSDEC in consultation with NYSDOH has determined that the site poses a significant threat to public health or the environment. This decision is based on the potential for human exposure to site-related contaminants via soil vapors.

How to Comment: NYSDEC is accepting written comments about the proposed plan, called a "Draft Remedial Action Work Plan (RAWP)" for 45 days, from March 22, 2023 through May 8, 2023.

Draft Remedial Work Plan: The proposed Unrestricted Use remedy consists of:

- Removal and disposal of any underground storage tanks (UST) if encountered;
- Excavation and off-site disposal of approximately 1,600 cubic yards of contaminated soil to about 15 feet below ground surface in the center of the site, and to about 5 feet in the southeastern portion of the site;
- Treatment of contaminated groundwater through injection of chemical oxidants;
- Collection and analysis of end-point soil samples and post-remedial groundwater samples to evaluate the effectiveness of the remedy;
- Implementation of a Health and Safety Plan (HASP) and Community Air Monitoring Plan (CAMP) during all ground intrusive activities;

- Completion of a soil vapor intrusion assessment in all areas of the basement level of the building following construction and prior to occupancy, to determine the need for activation of the sub-slab depressurization system;
- If an Unrestricted Use cleanup is not achieved, implementation of a Site Management Plan (SMP) would also be required for long-term maintenance of the remedial systems; and
- If an Unrestricted Use cleanup is not achieved, recording of an Environmental Easement to ensure proper use of the site may be necessary.

The proposed remedy was developed by the aplicant after performing a detailed investigation of the site under New York's Brownfield Cleanup Program (BCP).

Next Steps: NYSDEC will consider public comments, revise the cleanup plan as necessary, and issue a final Decision Document. NYSDOH must concur with the proposed remedy. After approval, the proposed remedy becomes the selected remedy. The applicants may then design and perform the cleanup action to address the site contamination, with oversight by NYSDEC and NYSDOH.

NYSDEC will keep the public informed throughout the investigation and cleanup of the site.

Site Description: The site is 0.24-acres and is bordered on the west by Old Ridge Road, on the south by 38th Ave, and on the north by a mixed-use building. It is currently fully fenced in with no structures. Past uses of the site include a warehouse used for carpet cleaning (1936-2006), automotive repair, gas filling station, and single family residences.

The proposed site redevelopment will include seven-story mixed-use building with a ventilated basement parking garage.

Summary of the Investigation: The primary contaminants of concern at the site are chlorinated volatile organic compounds (CVOCs), which are present site-wide in groundwater and soil vapor. Based on the site's previous uses as a carpet cleaner and automotive repair facility, the source is likely from historic discharges from machinery or storage tanks.

Brownfield Cleanup Program: New York's Brownfield Cleanup Program (BCP) encourages the voluntary cleanup of contaminated properties known as "brownfields" so that they can be reused and redeveloped. These uses may include recreation, housing, business or other uses. A brownfield site is any real property where a contaminant is present at levels exceeding the soil cleanup objectives or other health-based or environmental standards, criteria or guidance adopted by NYSDEC that are applicable based on the reasonably anticipated use of the property, in accordance with applicable regulations.


