Environmental Cleanup to Begin at Brownfield Site

Action is about to begin that will address contamination related to the 197 - 201 Canal Street site ("site") located at 197 - 201 Canal Street, Staten Island, NY, 10304. Please see the map for the site location. The cleanup activities will be performed by 197-201 Canal St. Realty LLC ("applicant") with oversight provided by the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (NYSDEC). NYSDEC has determined that the Remedial Action Work Plan (RAWP) protects public health and the environment and has approved the plan.

Remedial activities are expected to begin in February 2023 and last about 4 months.

Highlights of the Upcoming Cleanup Activities: The goal of the cleanup action for the site is to achieve cleanup levels that protect public health and the environment. The key components of the remedy are:

- Excavation and off-site disposal of approximately 940 cubic yards of contaminated soil between 2 and 6 feet below grade.
- Removal and off-site disposal of any underground storage tanks, fill ports and vents and any associated grossly contaminated soil, if encountered;
- Collection and analysis of end-point soil samples to evaluate the effectiveness of the remedy;
- Importation of clean material that meets the established Soil Cleanup Objectives for use as backfill;
- Installation of a site cover system, consisting of a concrete building foundation and/or paved parking lot, to prevent contact with remaining contaminated soil
- Implementation of a Community Air Monitoring Plan during all intrusive site activities;
- Implementation of a Health and Safety Plan during all site activities;
- Implementation of a Site Management Plan would also be required for long term maintenance of the remedial systems; and
- Recording of an Environmental Easement to ensure proper use of the site.

Next Steps: After the applicant(s) completes the cleanup activities, they will prepare a Final Engineering Report (FER) and submit it to NYSDEC. The FER will describe the cleanup activities completed and certify that cleanup requirements have been achieved or will be achieved.

When NYSDEC is satisfied that cleanup requirements have been achieved or will be achieved for the site, it will approve the Final Engineering Report. NYSDEC will then issue a Certificate of Completion to the applicant. The applicant would be able to redevelop the site in conjunction with receiving a Certificate of Completion. In addition, the applicant would be eligible for tax credits to offset the costs of performing cleanup activities and for redevelopment of the site.

NYSDEC will issue a fact sheet that describes the content of the FER. The fact sheet will identify any institutional controls (for example, environmental easements) or engineering controls (for example, a site cover) necessary at the site in relation to the issuance of the Certificate of Completion.

Site Description: The site is located in the Stapleton Heights neighborhood of Staten Island. The site is about 0.29-acres, identified as Block 527, Lot 50 on the Richmond County Tax Map. The site is bound by vacant land to the northeast, Canal Street followed by a parking lot and two 2-story residential and commercial buildings to the southeast, a one-story commercial and office building to the southwest, and nine two-story residential buildings to the northwest. The site is currently vacant, but was historically used for various commercial and light industrial uses including a hotel and second hand furniture store (1885), millinery (1885), hand printing shop and beer garden (1898), tin/metalworking shop (1917), bowling alley (1917 to 1950), cigar store (1928 to 1934), shoe company (1930), tire sales and services shop (1937), tackle shop (1960), barber shop (1965), food market (1965 to 1970) and metal storage (1981 to 1983).

The planned redevelopment includes a multi-story, mixed-use, commercial and affordable residential building with parking. The site is within the Special Bay Street Corridor District; area plans include developing additional commercial and residential buildings.

Brownfield Cleanup Program: New York's Brownfield Cleanup Program (BCP) encourages the voluntary cleanup of contaminated properties known as "brownfields" so that they can be reused and redeveloped. These uses include recreation, housing, business or other uses. A brownfield site is any real property where a contaminant is present at levels exceeding the soil cleanup objectives or other health-based or environmental standards, criteria or guidance adopted by NYSDEC that are applicable based on the reasonably anticipated use of the property, in accordance with applicable regulations.
