

CONFER: All of Niagara County should say 'no' to CWM expansion

Niagara Gazette — CWM Chemical Services maintains a 710-acre facility in the towns of Lewiston and Porter for the treatment, storage and disposal of hazardous and industrial non-hazardous wastes. Wastes accepted at this facility are disposed of in an on-site landfill (known as RMU-1) or shipped to another facility for further processing and disposal. CWM has plans in the works to create a new 43.5-acre landfill (RMU-2) just to the west of its current one. The new dump would have a capacity of 4 million cubic yards for the disposal of hazardous and industrial non-hazardous wastes and will reach its capacity in 10 to 20 years. If you'd like to immerse yourself in the details of the proposal, there is trove of information on the Department of Environmental Conservation website at dec.ny.gov/chemical/9075.html.

Last week, the DEC announced that a public comment period is now open

until July 7 in which interested parties can submit their feedback about the expansion.

Take advantage of that chance. We who live, work and play in Niagara County now have less than 60 days to make our voices heard and prevent this expansion.

Yes, prevent.

Sure, our economy needs a shot in the arm and most expansions of current businesses should be welcomed with open arms. But there are certain times when we as a society need to take a step back and ask if it's really the best thing for the health of our environment and our families. This is one of those times.

Realize that after the natural beauty of Niagara Falls and the mighty Niagara River, Niagara County is most known the world-over as being a cesspool of chemical waste (an odd amalgamation of contrasts). Before state/federal/international regulation and a better environmental understanding by the populace, manufacturers and tanneries dumped their offal into those waters, forever tainting them and their shorelines. Our own government also found it convenient to do the same while conducting the Manhattan Project.

Niagara Gazette — From the river to Love Canal to an Eighteenmile Creek so stricken with poison its fish can't be eaten (despite it being a tourist destination for fishing), it's no wonder that we all know someone who has suffered from cancer, MS and other ailments that are more pronounced here than in most other regions of the country.

It's likely CWM isn't to blame for any of that, but decades of direct exposure to the same chemicals that they are bringing here — just under different circumstances with different corporations (many of which no longer exist) — are to blame. We need to learn from those mistakes. CWM's landfill will possess a double composite liner system consisting of natural and synthetic materials with primary and secondary systems for leachate collection and removal and it will meet stringent regulatory operating and design requirements. Even so, anything can happen. These are containment systems designed by and built by man, an erred species, so leaks can and do occur.

On top of that, people regularly make mistakes or deliberate "errors." Case in point: In 2008, CWM agreed to pay a \$175,000 penalty to settle a

series of violations of its operating permit and state hazardous waste laws. At the time, the DEC noted dozens of violations including improperly labeled, deteriorating and leaking drums, disposal of non-hazardous waste without approval, process tank overflows, waste transporter conditions compliance failure and other issues. Those are just some of the problems that can occur on-site. Consider what can happen off-site. These wastes have to come from somewhere, and will be trucked in, as they are now, from all corners of the country, from communities that know better than to store hazardous wastes in their backyards. Those trucks pass through our neighborhoods, by our schools and near our creeks. Sooner or later, one of those trucks will have an accident (especially given our five months of winter driving). When that happens, who knows what will be unleashed.

Dear sir:

The Lewiston-Porter area does not need more hazardous waste. There are millions of tons of toxic waste already landfilled here, most of which was imported from outside the state. This is an undue burden to our area and risk to 95% of the country's fresh water supply.

In the Siting Plan, re-draft Sept, 2009, the DEC was obligated to discourage applications which add more landfill capacity in this same Great Lakes area by recognizing the existing inequitable burden.

We ask the DEC:

- 1) Follow the law which requires it consider the burden of the **type** and the **size** of hazardous waste treatment, storage or disposal facilities, *not* just the burden of the **number** of facilities.
- 2) Include the amount of hazardous waste still contained in each open and close commercial hazardous waste landfill when determining size, type and number of existing facilities.



The people in our area have had "enough!" Save our river, save our villages, protect our towns by saying goodbye to CWM.





Re: CWM Chemical Services, L.L.C. Proposed Landfill Project Model City, New York

Dear Mr. McClymonds;

I strongly oppose the approval of a permit for CWM's proposed expansion of its Model City, New York hazardous waste operations including RMU-2 and other related facilities. The fundamental issue is identified in CWM's siting documentation: the NYSDEC has determined that New York State does not need the expanded capacity and can rely on the national market for such facilities. No compelling public interest will be served by approval of the permit. In fact, the health, safety, and economic interests of local communities and citizens will be negatively impacted. Over the years, NYSDEC has consistently ignored these impacts with respect to CWM's operations. Approval of the permit may benefit CWM in the short term, but it will burden the community with the negative impact of storage of millions of tons of hazardous waste that will remain on the site forever!

Approval will also be clearly inconsistent with NYSDEC's own environmental justice policy that requires NYSDEC to "address disproportionate exposures to multiple environmental harms and risks". There is no doubt that CWM's operations have and will continue to impose such harms and risks on the local community if the permit is approved.

In summary, I strongly urge you to reject CWM's permit application for expansion of its landfill (RMU-2) and related operations. There is no public need or benefit for the expansion. On the other hand, if approved the expanded operations will impose significant negative health, safety, and economic burdens on the local community forever!





Please add my name to those who oppose CWM's expansion plans at the LOOW site in Niagara County (RMU-2).

I assume that the DEC understands that the LOOW property has become the chemical dumping ground of the eastern United States and Canada. I live in Youngstown, NY, on the Niagara River Gorge, in sight of where the river empties into Lake Ontario, two miles west of the LOOW facility and downriver from CWM's discharge outfall.

The decision whether to allow CWM Chemical Services to expand (RMU-2) is often framed as part of the perpetual struggle between economics and the environment. That view is too narrow.

In the first place, a cogent argument can be made that CWM has negatively affected the economy of Niagara County. Anecdotally, I have friends who would not move here because CWM is here.

In the second place, the economy versus the environment model should be set within the larger national picture of banking, media, and PAC money politics, and some Supreme Court judges who support such interests. I, like many others, fear that one-person, one-vote choices by informed individuals, the foundation of our republic, are being compromised.

In the third place, landfill for chemical waste is, says the DEC, the least desirable option for managing chemical waste and its studies show that there is sufficient landfill in the U.S. for the foreseeable future.

It is clear where CWM as company fits this picture. It is part of a giant multinational corporate empire whose track record includes many infractions. It is driven by self-perpetuation. The DEC has a historically informed, moral obligation to be the people's trusted gatekeeper. The profit motive of CWM must not guide the decision of DEC.


If the voices of the people and enlightened business professionals are to be heard, I hope and pray that the DEC will follow its mandate.



Re: CWM Chemical Services, LLC Proposed Landfill Project

Dear Judge McClymonds:

My office represents Niagara County, the Villages of Lewiston and Youngstown, and the Town of Lewiston (together, the "Municipal Stakeholders") in the above-referenced matter. I am writing on behalf of the Municipal Stakeholders¹ to request an extension of time to submit comments on the documents made available for the proposed RMU-2 landfill project referenced above. Sixty days has been provided for comments by the Department from the date this matter was noticed, May 5. For the reasons provided below, I am requesting 120 days.

The documents provided on which the public is invited to comment are unusually voluminous and complex, and comprise several interrelated applications that should be considered under Part 361 of the Department's regulations, governing the siting of hazardous waste facilities. These applications involve federal-only permits required by the Toxic Substances Control Act, 15 U.S.C. §§ 2601-2692 (under USEPA's authority), and by the Clean Water Act, Section 404, 33 U.S.C. § 1344 (under the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers' authority); federally delegated permits administered by the Department for which both federal and state regulations must be consulted, including permits to construct and operate hazardous waste facilities (under Part 373) and to discharge pollutants (under Article 17 of the ECL and the Clean Water Act, Section 402); and state-only permits, including an Air State Facility Permit (under Part 201) and a permit to discharge (under Part 633). In addition, the proposed project requires the Department's Water Quality Certification, required to qualify for a federal discharge permit (under Clean Water Act, Section 401, 33 U.S.C. § 1341). In addition, the project must be reviewed compre-hensively under the State Environmental Quality Review Act (E.C.L. §§ 8-0101 to 8-0117, and Part 617). Potential issues under any of these requirements may interact with others, further complicating the task of preparing useful comments to the Department.

The documents supporting CWM's request for these permits comprise several thousand pages of often highly technical materials requiring review by appropriate experts some of whose whose services the Municipal Stakeholders have only recently secured. Moreover, adequate

review of these materials requires evaluation of a substantial volume of historical technical reports by this facility, which has been in operation for decades, as well as historical technical reports by agencies and operators of adjacent managed waste sites, including Modern Landfill, Inc. and the formerly operated federal facility, Niagara Fall Storage Site, both operated or under active remediation across the CWM fence to the south. Adequate site characterization will benefit from, if not require, a full understanding of data generated by these two adjacent facilities.

In order to obtain the necessary information, the undersigned has made several requests to the Department pursuant to FOIL for relevant documentation not included in the materials provided by the Department, at least one of which is outstanding (No. 14-1688), and I anticipate further such requests may be necessary.

The proposed project is clearly one of the largest and most complicated the Department has considered in recent memory. For this and the reasons provided above, I urge you to approve the requested extension of time to comment.
